

In 2010, WFWP USA focused its activities on inspiring, empowering and strengthening the local chapters centering on the new vision under the new leadership of Angelika Selle. Following the tradition in 30 chapters across the country, each local chapter held monthly or quarterly meetings that would incorporate WFWP's mission and vision to empower and educate women of all ages through guest speakers, service projects, fundraisers and building a community of like-minded women. Meetings ranged from a program to educate Afghan girls; fundraising and donating to a local youth organization called Youth Net, Inc.; annual High School Essay Scholarship Contest on abstinence before marriage; Schools of Africa Benefits fundraisers; Haiti Relief Project fundraisers; networking at the International Women's Day event of Peacemakers, Inc.; and welcome meetings for the new President.

Starting from her inauguration in March 2010, President Angelika Selle started a tour to visit chapters across the United States including: Maryland, Virginia, New Jersey, New York, San Francisco, Chicago, Florida, and Los Angeles. Mrs. Selle introduced herself to the communities, shared her vision and focus for the next three years, and promoted the new focus on human rights. In April, the headquarters office relocated to New York City from Bridgeport, Connecticut. WFWP USA had a reorganization of chapters and Board of Directors, began re-branding WFWP USA and redesigned and updated the website by working with experts on a regular basis to improve outreach.

Beginning in April 2010, President Selle accompanied Rev. In Jin Moon, the president and CEO of HSA-UWC and the second daughter of our Founder, Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon, to visit Congress every Wednesday until October to Senators and Congressmen on the kidnapping and violation of human rights issues in Japan with regards to Unification Church members who are also members of WFWP. WFWP USA collaborated with other organizations to raise awareness on these practices outside of Congress as well. National activities relating to "Human Rights and Women's Dignity" in collaboration with other organizations include the Human Rights Teas meetings, Rallies in 10 cities, and local chapters writing letters to their local their Representative in Congress.

In June, WFWP USA provided funds to rent a house in Haiti for ongoing projects in Cap-Haitian, the capitol, to help the community which was still suffering from the earthquake in February. WFWP members from Florida, as well as from the WFWP student chapter at the University of South Florida, joined International Relief Friendship Foundation (IRFF) for a service project to Haiti for 2 weeks, bringing basic over the counter medicine, vitamins and hygiene products.

In August, a national chairwomen's retreat entitled "New Beginnings: Refresh, Rejuvenate, Reenergize," was held in Las Vegas for all national leadership to attend and connect to the new vision and focus.

In September, the 18<sup>th</sup> Anniversary National Assembly brought together over 400 women of all ages for a three day conference designed to educate and engage WFWP members on a national level. The keynote speaker was Rev. In Jin Moon who spoke on "Human Rights and Women's Dignity", focusing on the faith-breaking issues in Japan.

In October, the 11<sup>th</sup> Annual International Leaders Workshop, with the theme "May You Raise Us Up" in South Korea and a delegation of 6 women from the United States attended.

In December, the Board of Directors met for three days in New York to discuss goals and strategic planning for 2011.
