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Women and Girls in the Era of Technology

Every year the <u>United Nations Commission on the Status of Women</u> (CSW) hosts a 10-day session in March, where UN member states (who send delegations to represent their country), civil society (citizens and organizations outside of the government and private sector), and gender experts **gather at the UN headquarters** in New York to discuss important issues related to gender equality and the **empowerment of women and girls.** The session tackles three themes that change annually: a priority theme, a review theme (this reviews the progress on implementing the agreed conclusions from an earlier year), and an emerging issue theme.

They are based on one of the 12 issues of concern highlighted in the Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing 1995.

This year was the first time since the pandemic that the UN decided to open its doors once again to have the 10-day annual event...

Celebrating Black History Month Councilwoman Hodge related many of her experiences growing up as a young girl experiencing injustice; she was curious about the "where are the other black figures" and wanted to teach her Black community about the accomplishments and achievements of many other Black role models. She is very passionate about being a strong voice in the community and is highly focused on building a community of Black leaders for generations to follow....

For the past 20 years, Women's Federation for World Peace USA has been consistently supporting the Schools of Africa Project, thanks to the wonderful efforts of local chapters and members around the country that continue to find ways to give.

JAMOO Social Self Support Assistance Center was started in Senegal in 1995 to train women in lace-making, dressmaking, home economics and embroidery skills. They also learn skills in business administration so they can manage or start their own businesses. The support also provides an onthe-job training center.

We would like to share with you a recent letter of appreciation and pictures from the school, and extend our heartfelt gratitude to all those who offered donations and made this possible. Between the school's two locations six electric sewing machines, one industrial sewing machine, and four foot pedal sewing machines were purchased with the funds sent from WFWP USA in 2022....
