



Daughter of the late New York Congressman Hamilton Fish, **Alexa Fish Ward** is a member of one of America's longest-serving political families. Mrs.Ward, President of WFWP, USA, has attended the annual **First Lady's Luncheon** in Washington, DC, for the past five years. This year's luncheon was held at the Washington Hilton hotel on April 30th.

The First Lady's Luncheon is organized by the **Congressional Club**, which was formed in 1908

to encourage non-partisan socializing among spouses and relatives of members of Congress, the Supreme Court, and the President's Cabinet. In 1912, the Club first held a Breakfast in honor of the First Lady of the United States. That breakfast developed into the annual **First Lady's Luncheon**, the Congressional Club's most prestigious affair.

First Lady Michelle Obama was the honoree at this year's festive and beautifully decorated luncheon. Over 2,000 attendees sat at tables arrayed with white, blue, and green toile specially designed for the occasion by the **Kravet Company**. Every year since 2001, Kravet Inc. has custom designed and donated a special fabric for the First Lady's Luncheon, and it is used for tablecloths and other decorations.

The gathering was an occasion for the First Lady to stress the universal values of family, service and caring for others. When Mrs. Obama spoke, she first described her family's adjustments to their new life in the White House. She talked about how much help her mother -- the "First Grandmother" – has been with childcare needs for daughters Sasha, and Malia. One of the unexpected delights of the First Lady has been Bo, their new dog.

She said she gets up early every day to take him for a walk, which is a plus for her own fitness.

Mrs. Obama's message focused on **service**, which she stated is "**embedded in our core values**" as a nation, and she saluted the 62 million people who volunteer their time and services each year. Furthermore, she praised the fact that \$300 billion is generously donated

by Americans to support the work of religious organizations, foundations, and non-profits that are doing important work.

With the current economic downturn, there has been a rise in demand for the **SNAP** program, formerly known as Food Stamps. Mrs. Obama has personally worked at a food bank in the Washington, DC area, and she thanked all the people around the country who volunteer with various food bank programs.

"Whether it's a food bank or a homeless shelter, there's so much need out there," she said, as she urged people to use their particular talent to help others in their community. She stressed that the "can-do" spirit of America will get us through these difficult economic times, and that we can all work together for the common good, regardless of our political affiliations.

Ja Han Moon and her husband, the Rev. Sun Myung Moon, have been working together to build lasting peace in the world for more than forty years.

Earlier this year, Mrs. In Jin Moon assumed the position of President and CEO of the Family Federation for World Peace and Unification, USA. She is deeply committed to uplifting the family as the cornerstone for peace in the world. Married for 25 years, she and her husband, Jin Sung Park, have four sons and one daughter.

Meeting with the women in the Unification community has been the expressed desire of Mrs. In Jin Moon for a long time. WFWP, USA was asked to organize the June 14th event, and plans began to take form in early May.

At the Lovin' Life Ministries Sunday Morning Service, Mrs. In Jin Moon gave an inspiring message which included the following comments:

...(W)e have this incredible opportunity to build what I call an **ideal family**—meaning "I deal" with my parents, "I deal" with my friends. Or maybe from a child's point of view—"I deal" with my sister, ... with my brother. But all of this dealing, so to speak, is a way that we can truly learn to love each other, by practicing true love in the family. ...

Many times when we say we want world peace, we want it out there somewhere, but the true secret is that world peace starts from each and every one of us, and it starts in the building block of the family and in the great team that we can build.

Following the service, a delicious lunch was served, with tasteful stations of cheese, salads, and fresh fruit, as well as ice cold drinks.

In the afternoon, Mrs. Moon addressed the special gathering of women for about forty minutes. She presented a vision for peace in the world based on **healthy and strong families**. She highlighted the woman's role of wife and mother as central to the health and well being of the family. Beyond her words, she conveyed a depth of **heart** and **conviction** that profoundly touched the audience. Here are just a few excerpts from that talk:

... I know for a fact that I am only effective as a leader if I continue to be an effective mother. So as

important as my new position is, I know that my primary position is to continue raising my children,...and make sure they are not just **spiritually** and **physically** healthy but also **emotionally** healthy....

One of my favorite guitarists, **Jimmy Hendrix**, said something that was quite profound. He said, "**Knowledge speaks**; **wisdom listens**." My addendum to that would be, "Knowledge speaks; wisdom listens; **children observe**." The things that children observe and take in with their five senses are the kinds of things that feed their soul, that feed the inner quality of how they feel about who they are, ... In our household, **words are very precious**.

... A social worker told me something quite shocking. He said that the most extreme and violent youth tend to come from families that are still intact. But when you look into such

households, you see that the father and the mother are always screaming at each other. ... If raised in a family like this, children do not understand how to express themselves emotionally and spiritually. They are hurting so much inside but they don't know how to constructively channel the anger within, so it shows up in violence....

We as women need to create a kind of environment where our ... future daughters and granddaughters know

that, of course, men and women are biologically different, thank goodness, but they're just as precious to God as men in their value and divinity as human beings....

A journalist friend of mine ...has been bringing aid to underground schools in Afghanistan where thousands of young, bright, and beautiful girls are trying to study so they can have a better future. He told me of one incident: ... A group of boys in their late teens came rushing in to one of the schools, took off the girls' headdresses, and poured acid in their faces. ...

I don't know how you feel as women but I know how I felt as a mother.... If that kind of incident is still occurring in this world today, how can we sit still and allow this to continue?...

This is something that we as members of the **Women's Federation** must highlight. We must **talk** about this and **encourage** each other to **seek equal rights** and equal opportunity for our **sisters** all around the world.

I feel the best way to do that is to start in our **homes** with our sons and daughters. When a son makes a comment to his sister like, "You're just a stupid girl. Why would you want to learn karate?" it should be the **mother** who takes him aside and sets him straight. She should say, "Son, your sister can be a black belt just like you can. She's a person just as special as you are." It's these kinds of life-changing conversations that are going to create a generation of young men and women who can **change the world**. ...

So instead of imitating an extreme women's movement that resorts to belittling or stepping on men because they've done us so much harm, we can be a **better** movement, a whole new movement of women, of sisters and of daughters, when we realize that it's our divine right to be special. It's our divine right to share our **brilliance** together with our brothers. ...

Our most **important** work is the work we need to do in our homes. The responsibility of the **spoken word**, especially the ramifications that our words have on our spouse, on our children, and in our environment, is something that we must really take to heart and practice in our daily lives.

This is a great time for women. I encourage you to get involved. Please see me as your sister who is working right along with you. Let's change this world. Let's change America!

At the end of her talk, Mrs. Moon was presented with flowers by Tamami Kawamura, Executive Director of WFWP, USA. Jamie Carroll, who went to Zambia as part of WFWP's 2008 youth service trip, presented Mrs. Moon with a card and a gift. A group photo was taken to mark the happy occasion.

The central position of **parents** in the education of children is emphasized in the programs of WFWP. When parents value reading and learning, and they convey that to their little ones, those children have a head start in school, as well as in life.

The **Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy** was founded in 1989 by then First Lady Barbara Bush, who recognized the power of her position to inspire others. Having raised her own family with a strong emphasis on reading, she established a foundation to promote literacy, her lifelong passion. Her foundation has been providing annual grants since then on a competitive basis to literacy programs helping young people and adults improve their prospects for greater happiness and family prosperity.

The Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy has now surpassed \$32 million in grants to all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Awardees have included nonprofit organizations, correctional institutions, homeless shelters, schools, libraries, and faith-based agencies.

Doro Bush Koch, who lives in Bethesda, Maryland, with her family, was inspired by her mother's work and created the **Maryland Family Literacy Initiative** in 2003 with her sister-in-law, Tricia Reilly Koch. An estimated 20% of Maryland's residents lack the literacy skills they need to participate fully in society. This not only limits their own quality of life, it can also seriously limit their children's development of literacy skills. The Maryland Family Literacy Initiative awards **annual grants** to programs serving low-income, low-literacy residents of the state.



Traveling always ignites anticipation and excitement in me. On Thursday, June 4, 2009, over two thousand people from across avenues of the Americas the attended the black tie, star-studded celebration of this civil rights pioneer, this American legend and the namesake of the Eleventh Annual Uncommon Heights Gala. It was indeed grand, magical, and glamorous with pomp ceremony, including top-brass in dress uniforms from the U.S. Navy, Marines, and Coast Guard.

I'm proud to note that Texas was outstandingly well represented. Behind the velvet rope at the VIP Reception were Isabel Cottrell, co-

founder, Proline Corporation; Dr. Molly Williams, NCNW Texas Director; Carolyn Matthews, NCNW National Board Member; Sharon Beard, NCNW Section President.

Other legends in attendance at the gala were poet Maya Angelou; actress Cicely Tyson; former president of Spelman College Dr. Johnnetta Cole; Susan Taylor, editor emerita of *Essence* Magazine; Comedians Dick Gregory and Sheryl Underwood. The list of notables goes on and on.

Finally, of course, we got to see the "Pope-Rah," Oprah Winfrey, honoree of this year's banquet, along with her close friend, Gail King. The adoration and lofty praise were so intense in that room that the emcee, Shaun Robinson, hostess of "Access Hollywood," had to repeatedly remind

camera-wielding acolytes to return to their tables. The entourage of non-stop stunning fashions was better than watching the Tournament of Roses Parade or the well-dressed who attend elite the Kentucky Derby.

Dr. Height was amazing. Although confined to a wheelchair, she was alert, beautifully attired and in command of every action and activity. Of course, she was also wearing a fine-looking, color-

coordinated hat. The room was silent with not a creature stirring as she reminisced, often chuckling out loud at her own comments. She spoke of her friendship with First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt; terrible personal recollections of lynchings, as well as the poll tax and the civil rights marches. She gave praise to her mentor, Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, NCNW founder.

Oprah Winfrey was feted not only for her business savvy but also for her philanthropy, especially the donation of \$2.5 million to pay down the mortgage on the national office of the National Council of Negro Women. That location was once the

site of a slave market on Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, D.C. The building is still referred to as the most expensive piece of real estate owned by African Americans in the country.



The dinner program included recognition of two exceptional women. The **2009 UN Women for Peace Award** went to **Her Majesty Queen Noor** of Jordan for her lifetime contribution to the advancement of women's issues, her international humanitarian works and efforts in the areas of world peace and justice. Queen Noor could not attend, so UN Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon will present her with the award at a later date.

Following are excerpts from a taped message presented at the gala by Secretary General Ban:

The cause of gender equality should unite all of us. ... Women have been long active in lobbying and organizing for peace. ... However, women's concerns do not always reach the negotiating table, much less any final peace document.

At the same time, women are among those who suffer the most harm during conflicts, for example when rape is used as a weapon of war...

When women participate in peace negotiations and in crafting a peace agreement, their societies are the winners... For my

part, I pledge to continue doing my utmost to keep the United Nations at the forefront of this effort.

Mrs. Ban Soon-taek, wife of Secretary General Ban, is a patron of *Women for Peace*, and she presented the *UN Women for Peace 2009 Recognition Award* to American Nobel Peace Prize laureate, **Jody Williams.** Ms Williams' special focus has been to eliminate landmines throughout the world, and she has also been a spokesperson and chief strategist for the International Committee of the Red Cross.

Women's Federation for World Peace, International President **Lan Young Moon** came all the way from South Korea to attend this special gala. President Moon bid on and won an auctioned painting called "Sunset on"

Celebrating the Legacy of U Thant at the United Nations

Women's Federation for World Peace, USA leaders are often invited to special UN celebrations, such as the recent commemoration of the 100th birthday anniversary of U Thant. U Thant was a diplomat from Burma (now known as Myanmar) elected as third Secretary-General of the United Nations, serving from 1961 to 1971. (*In Burmese, "U" is an honorific similar to "Mister," so he had only one name: Thant.*) He led the UN at a particularly tense time in world history that included the Cuban Missile Crisis, civil war in the Congo, as well as the Vietnamese War.

U Thant was a devout Buddhist who sought to apply Buddhist principles and practices to his work at the UN. He regarded the notions of metta (good will) and karuna (compassion) as the bedrock not only of his own belief system but also of the UN and its Charter. He was known for his inclusive attitude toward people of differing beliefs and faiths, as long as they were focused on reconciliation, harmony, and world oneness.

The **U** Thant Institute was founded in 2003 to reflect U Thant's vision of a global society guided by a spirit of "One World." (www.uthantinstitute.org) June 3, 2009, was named, *A Day of Commemoration Celebrating the Legacy of U Thant*, and a luncheon was held at the United Nations' Delegates' Dining Room. Longtime WFWP supporter, Professor Win Win Kyi, a native of Burma, invited WFWP representatives to this luncheon.

Win Win Kyi is an associate professor and international counselor at Bergen (NJ) Community College. She is also vice-president of the Myanmar Youth Association, NY, USA. Her distinguished family fled Myanmar in 1963 after a military coup, in the wake of oppression and political hostility. She has been an educator for over three decades, with an expertise in international communications. She has initiated many projects to assist the needy in Myanmar as well as in the USA.

In 2005, Professor Kyi was one of eight Americans attending the WFWP International Leadership Workshop in Moscow.

Comments from Professor Win Win Kyi:

As I believe in One God, One Sun, One Moon, One Earth and One Heart, I am a fervent believer that peace for all humanity is in the horizon. ...

I believe that my outreach goes beyond the comfort of my college and university whether I am at Bergen Community College or my summer teaching at Yale University. Through God's grace, I have been able to transfer my counseling and teaching skills to reach out to those who are victims of diseases and disasters. For all of it, I am eternally grateful.

We are grateful to Professor Kyi for the opportunity of attending the UN luncheon commemorating the 100th birthday of U Thant.

The atmosphere was buzzing with excitement as guests and dignitaries from around the world gathered.

Many current ambassadors and directors of various UN-related organizations were present. Guests were greeted with lilting violin music performed by a lovely group of young women dressed in white satin dresses. As refreshments were served, Daw Aye Aye Thant, U Thant's daughter, greeted the guests. ("Daw" is an honorific for Burmese women.)

The highlight of the luncheon was the address given by the current Secretary General, Ban Ki-moon, who spoke with great respect and admiration for his predecessor. He noted that U Thant, "helped to defuse cold war tensions. He oversaw the (UN) organization's growth -- both in membership and scope. And he helped lay the foundations for what we now call sustainable development."

Secretary Ban added that, "U Thant's roots as a teacher also provided the seeds for the United Nations University and the institute that bears his name, which is built on the concept of 'One World'."

Being present at this significant event enables WFWP to offer support for the people and programs that make up the United Nations. It also helps those of us

who were there to understand our vital role as a non-governmental organization in general consultative status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations. We are honored to have shared in such a meaningful gathering.

Women's Federation for World Peace is a non-governmental organization (NGO) in general consultative status with the United Nations. This status is currently granted to only about 140 organizations out of 2,870 NGOs registered with the UN. Among the criteria for achieving this status are that the group have a broad geographical reach and be dedicated to the purposes of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) of the UN.

Primary among the purposes of the ECOSOC is the achievement of eight Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) to be achieved by 2015 which address the world's main development challenges. They include eradicating extreme poverty and hunger; achieving
