The Assembly began on the evening of August 4th with a memorable introduction to the WFWP by its International president, Profesor Lan Young Moon. Mrs. Angelika elle then explained the WFWP JSA's new vision, which focuses on eveloping the grassroots WFWP in the United States, addressing the

problematic state of the nuclear family, and raising the nex generation of young women who will strive to create peace in the world.

On Friday, August 5th Rev. In Jin Moon encouraged her audience to exercise peace in a familial context: "Only by understanding how to accomplish peace in a family setting can we truly create peace on a world level." Her message continued with insights as a mother and advice to "clean up" in order to unlock the power of relationships.

Another speaker, Ms. Nia Lyte, a Colombian-born talk show host and former Ms. Hispana from Los Angeles, spoke about the "inner beauty" of women and how she, an entertainment celebrity, decided to reject offers to pose nude for financial compensation.

"Develop your inner beauty," Ms. Lyte encouraged her listeners, "and develop yourselves as thinkers. In my career, I turned certain jobs down because I wanted to maintain my integrity and my value. It's time to represent women as thinkers. Remember

that no one can take my or your inner beauty away."

Mrs. Sandra Lowen, a professional counselor and trauma therapist, provided insights on the importance of communication. "Communication is the life water of relationships," Mrs. Lowen said. "The tongue has the power of life and death. How do you react when someone can't speak your 'language'? Saying what you said with more force is not the best way to communicate; doing the same thing day after day, and expecting a different response is a sign of insanity. We're out today to

stop the insanity. Let's be a beautiful daughter, sister, and mother, who brings this message home to our spouses."

Dr. Gita Bangera, a microbiologist and the principal administrator of ComGen: The Community College Genomics Research Initiative, introduced a new method of how to instill in women confidence and the sense that they deserve an education, especially in science.

"Everyone deserves a perfect relationship," said Dr. Bangera. "Women have a preconceived notion that they are not good enough in science; they don't always get the respect that they deserve. We as women need to be contributing to the world. Take yourselves seriously — do not take your power for granted. No relationship can be strong unless the woman can be strong. Let's challenge ourselves. Mothers, teach your girls to be resilient." Toshia Shaw-Lacy, founder of Purple

New York Hosts Relief Concert for Victims of Recent Natural Disasters

On Saturday, July 9 at the Lovin' Life Learning Center in Manhattan, the New York chapter of WFWP held a Relief Concert for the victims of the tsunami in Japan and the tornadoes in Alabama. Chairwoman Beryl Green and her team hosted over 100 guests, including a representative from the Japanese Consulate in New York City, along with 13 performing artists, raising over \$1,000 for the Red Cross and the victims of the recent tragedies

"We've had a few events like this before and included a wide a variety of performances, but I really think people want to just support causes like this. That's what made this event so successful," said Tal Zorer, an event organizer who's been a WFWP volunteer for two years.

"But," she added, "we also understood that our heart and prayers are with the Japanese people, not just our money."

For a \$10 donation, guests enjoyed song and dance from a variety of performers. There were also Japanese sushi, a display of art, and reports about the current situation in Japan. Several speakers said they felt compelled to come, and had a desire to serve and connect with brothers and sisters who are suffering and to show their compassion for those elsewhere in the world.

"The concern is really global; every region should try to help," commented Chairwoman Green. "We are all interconnected, we are all one family under God, and we should care. When families are going through this, it's important to show our love. No matter who we are, wherever disaster strikes, we need to show compassion," she added.

The New York chapter will continue to make a conscious effort to care and is planning on hosting more benefit concerts in the next few months. Tal pointed out that it took her a long time to join a women's organization in her native country, Israel, because of the political agenda that predominated.
