## "The Turning Point": Let the Turning Begin!

20th Anniversary Celebration of Women's Federation Kicks off in Las Vegas

Distinguished women leaders and Ambassadors for Peace from various walks of life convened at the M Resort Spa Casino in Las Vegas, Nevada, on Thursday, October 25, 2012, to participate in the Opening Session of "The Turning Point," the 20th Anniversary National Assembly of Women's Federation for World Peace (WFWP). Approximately 400 women attended the session in the Milan Ballroom at 7:30 p.m.

Dorothy Hill, WFWP New York chairwoman, introduced President of WFWP International Dr. Lan Young Moon, a follower of Unification Church Founders Rev. and Mrs. Sun Myung Moon for 58 years who has traveled to North Korea more than 20 times during the past 20 years as a WFWP representative.

Dr. Moon offered introductory remarks that were interjected with tears at the mention of the late Rev. Moon, and showed an extensive presentation featuring the accomplishments of WFWP since its founding in 1992. The full transcript of her speech can be read <u>here</u>.

President of WFWP USA and Vice President of WFWP International Angelika Selle followed with a speech titled "Why Are We Here?" during which she showed a six-minute video featuring major accomplishments of WFWPand recognized various members and former leaders of WFWP, including the first and second presidents of WFWP USA, Nora Spurgin and Alexa Ward respectively. "What are we doing here? Why are we here?" said Mrs. Selle. "We are reflecting on the past to appreciate, honor, and lift those that have laid the foundation. We will also deal with the present, as shown by the speakers here together with us. They want to tell us how women can make a difference in different areas from media, business, religion, to all areas where we need change desperately.

A Multicolored Bouquet of Sisterhood: The Bridge of Peace Ceremony Las Vegas Conference Continues with the Bridge of Peace Ceremony



The highlight of the day was the Bridge of Peace Ceremony, renowned for having brought together thousands of women who are historical enemies to create partnerships for peace. Linda Lucero, the evening's emcee, offered a Native American prayer song, and Rev. Juanita Pierre-Louis briefly explained the history of the Bridge of Peace Ceremony, which was inspired by Mrs. Tomiko Duggan, a leader of the GWPN and WFWP office in Washington, D.C.

"When two women stand on opposite sides of the bridge and bow in repentance for anything their ancestors might have done or that they've done, the bow means asking for forgiveness," said Rev. Pierre-Louis. "As the two women cross to the center to meet each other, they cross over fear, resentment, and pain and embrace the other.

"We have used the Bridge of Peace," she continued, "to unite former enemies and current ones - Catholics and Protestants, Serbs and Bosnians, Israelites and Arabs, Jews and Christians, Christians and Muslims, and others, uniting women and girls in a multicolored bouquet of sisterhood."

Catherine Cromwell and Sarah Canak-Brown, chairwomen of WFWP in Virginia and Nevada, respectively, colored the evening with their lighthearted banter and proudly introduced the 15 or so couples, including Mrs. Selle and her daughter, who participated in the Bridge of Peace Ceremony. The evening concluded with a collective activity during which women exchanged certificates with the women sitting behind them, signifying a commitment to work together

#### on a cause to further world peace.

Lorna Todd, a Filipina woman who crossed the bridge with Mrs. Duggan, a Japanese woman, offered her testimony: "When I arrived at the venue, 10 minutes before the event started, I was very surprised and also happy to find out that I would be crossing the bridge with Tomiko Duggan. I felt so honored to be her new 'sister.' I kept asking myself, 'Why me?' I heard a lot about this ceremony, but I had never seen the actual event or been part of it. But, as Juanita spoke on the podium about the history, the significance, and what the Bridge Ceremony can do to an individual, I couldn't help myself from crying, and even as I am writing this now, remembering those moments, my eyes are welling with tears.

# **Clean Slate and Sushi**


News from WFWP San Francisco Bay Area Chapter

One of the projects the women are getting involved with is the Clean Slate Project, an original program and curriculum offered by WFWP, designed for young people who want to renew their commitment to purity. They held a meeting recently with those interested and formed a committee. Sarah Brown and Liz Buergi, both of Northern California, who are both passionate about this project, will be the co-chairs.

When asked what inspired her to get involved with this project, Mrs. Brown replied: "I see there is a real need for abstinence education, especially in the state of California. When I was in college, I saw how the topic of sexuality can be taught in a very warped way. If people have no basis of values regarding sexuality, these kinds of [warped] values can be very easily adopted." # **Bridging Divides**

Ohio Chapter's Bridge of Peace Ceremony

In a display of the truth that people can reconcile their differences, the WFWP Ohio Chapter held a Bridge of Peace\* ceremony, symbolically bringing together women of different faiths.



In the ceremony, women representing historical enemies start on opposite sides of a makeshift bridge set up on a stage, then walk toward each other, crossing the bridge together and joining in the middle.



Sheik Yusuf Estes, a prominent American-born Islamic speaker, and his wife were attendants at the event. Sheik Yusuf presented an introduction to the Muslim faith.

In the ceremony, hosted by the Noor Islamic Cultural Center in Dublin, Ohio, women took turns crossing the bridge with a woman of a different faith. Six Muslim women crossed the bridge with six WFWP representatives, then exchanged "sisterhood certificates" and a rose to commemorate their new bond.

"Coming from the Jewish faith," said Caryn Olsson of Ohio, a WFWP representative who crossed the bridge with a Muslim woman, "it was quite profound to feel the coming together of the two religions. As sisters, it is our calling to be the peacemakers and to initiate programs where we can come together and get to know one another on a deeper level."

The event also included a silent auction to raise funds for future WFWP Ohio activities.

Heidi's tour has made stops in Colorado, Los Angeles, and the San Francisco Bay Area to groups grateful to learn the curriculum and eager to spread the message to their local communities.

New York Christmas Benefit Concert for Schools of Africa Project

But the most moving part of the evening was the moment in the program when Mrs. Selle was offered a gift basket - and then insisted on sharing the gifts with others. Some attendants were moved to tears by her act of generosity.

### Loving the Unloved

WFWP Chicago - A Cook County Christmas

This past Christmas, the WFWP Chicago Chapter joined with the local organization Operation PUSH to help meet the basic needs of women in the Cook County Correctional Center. Fannie Smith, a WFWP member and former office administrator for Operation PUSH, teamed up with fellow WFWP member Patricia Fliginger to respond to a request for help by Queen Mother Rev. Sinclair, a woman who, though in her 90s, serves as a chaplain in the prisons.

Using the help of Chicago Unification Church members, the women were able to donate nearly 100 pairs of women's underwear and many toiletry items, which they delivered on Christmas Day.

Said Mrs. Fliginger of the project, "Because of this simple demonstration of love and kindness, walls blocking people from loving and caring for each other are being removed. Everyone is hurting and crying inside in one way or another. Through interacting with each other, we can begin to heal the wounds of the past and learn how to live in this world together with more compassion. We especially want to love the unloved with God's love and care for the neglected women who populate the prisons."
