

Let Us Be The Peace

Together with four collaborator organizations, the WFWP Oregon Chapter organized an Interfaith Peace Service, Meditation, and Dance celebration to commemorate the UN International Day of Peace via the Internet and our own live program.

The event took place on Sunday, September 21 in West Linn, Oregon, with the cooperation of the Portland Family Peace Fellowship, the Wholistic Peace Institute, BeThePeace (a global event through live streaming), and instructors of Dances of Universal Peace.

Peace messages were delivered by Pastor Eric Sylte and two Ambassadors for Peace, Mr. Gary Spanovich of the Wholistic Peace Institute and Chaplain Claudia Al-Amin, WFWP Oregon chairwoman. Two special guests, Mr. Michael Sheehan and Ms. Michaelle Sparks-Smith, led everyone in four dances of universal peace. (See their website for more information: www.movingmeditations-dup.com.) The dances represented interfaith traditions of Christianity, Judaism, and Sufism (Islam), as well as a


peace dance from Russia. All could feel a new spirit and hope for peace through dancing together. Even WFWP's most senior local member danced the peace dances and inspired all of us!

The event was part of a collaboration of organizations around the world joining to create what may become the largest synchronized prayer and meditation for peace in history. With over 400 organizers registered to hold events across all continents, BeThePeace has become an opportunity for world cultures to connect as one voice for peace with the tagline "Everyone, Everywhere, Together, Now."

The International Day of Peace was sanctioned by the United Nations General Assembly in 1981 by UN Resolution 36/37. Inspired by the collaboration between the Culture of Peace Initiative and Peace One Day, two organizations that have organized global truths and peace initiatives and have impacted on millions of people over the years, many global peace

organizations now collaborate to celebrate this day on September 21. The 2014 theme is "Rights of Peoples to Peace." All people of every culture, spiritual tradition, and political perspective are welcomed to join "Together As One" on this special day. Breaking Free!

On Saturday, October 4, the Minnesota Chapter of Women's Federation for World Peace gathered to explore the issue of human trafficking and to see what we can do to help stop this serious problem facing our young people today.

First, Ms. Jennifer Victor-Larsen, founder of HeroSearch.org, gave an overview of the facts about human trafficking. She talked about the prevalence of trafficking in Minnesota and let us know that Minnesota ranks 13th in the nation in terms of human trafficking incidence. It was a surprise to learn that this issue is so close to home in Minnesota. We expect it to be rampant in Third World countries, not in our own backyard.

Ms. Lori Stee, public policy and education director of Breaking Free, spoke next. Breaking Free is an organization that educates and provides services for girls and women who have been victims of abuse and sexual exploitation. She showed us the CNN report on the organization. The report showed some of the women, all survivors of human trafficking, who have been helped by the work of the organization. Their primary message is, "Women are not for sale."

Lori also let us know that recruiters of young girls and women go everywhere to recruit anyone who seems lost, sad, and alone. It is important that

everyone should be aware of this information. She also explained that the challenge to eliminate this problem has to do with the narrative of how women have been viewed throughout history as temptresses and the cause of sexual problems.

Only recently have exploited women come to be viewed as victims instead of criminals. And this change in attitude is mainly because of the work of organizations like Breaking Free that work to help restore the dignity of the kidnapped young women and men who are lured and often forced unwittingly into sex trafficking.

After Ms. Stee's presentation, Ms. Victor-Larsen talked about her organization, Herosearch.org. She showed us how we can use this website to donate locally to Breaking Free and other organizations that help those in need. She also explained that WFWP could use the site to handle donations for the projects that...

On September 10, Mrs. Catherine Ichinohe, WFWP Denver's former chairwoman, attended the UNA's quarterly gathering at the famous Mizel Museum, a center for Jewish history, art, and culture. There is also a school attached to the museum. Oddly enough, the building was designed by a non-Jewish man.

The eight guests were greeted by the museum keeper, who is a scholar of Jewish history and the Torah. A luncheon of traditional Jewish delicacies had been prepared on site and was topped off with Turkish coffee.

A video presentation entitled, "Israel: Small but Magnificent," was shown to convey the flavor of the land and its people.

The speaker, a Philadelphia woman, had lived in Israel for 13 years. She married and had given birth to two children there. She spoke objectively, without political bias, about her life in Israel, saying that residents there want a good community for their families to live in and go out of their homes frequently.

The government in Israel supports a modern public educational system. Each child has a laptop to use for his or her studies.
